The event was hosted at the NCSU McKimmon Center in Raleigh. Governor Roy Cooper and LtGen Walter E. Gaskin, USMC, (Ret.), Secretary of the NC DMVA welcomed participants to the event.

Secretary Gaskin Helps

Second Graders See Why It's So Important to Recognize and *Take Chances* in Life


Second graders at Hunter GT/AIG Basics Magnet Elementary in Raleigh got a special visit this month. NC DMVA Secretary, Walter Gaskin stopped by to meet with the students and share some of his experiences in the Marines and other life events.

As part of **Read Across America Day**, Secretary Gaskin read the story, "What Do You Do With a Chance?" written by Kobi Yamada and Illustrated by Mae Besom. In this story, a child is visited by his first chance and unsure what he should do with it, and he lets it go. Later on, when a new chance arrives, he reaches for it, but this time he misses and falls. Embarrassed and afraid, he begins ignoring each new chance that comes by, even though he still wants to take them. He has to figure out to how to overcome fear so he can make the most of any other chance that might come his way. While this story is geared toward children, it holds a message that is an important reminder for adults, too.

Secretary Gaskin and the children posed for photos and he taught the children how to salute during the visit, too.

Read Across America Day is an annual event celebrated on or near March 2nd, which is the birthday of children's author Dr. Seuss. In 1987, the National Education Association (NEA) created the nationwide reading celebration to promote literacy and encourage a love of reading among children. It is now a week-long celebration









to encourage children and teens to read to promote language skills, but also to enhance every part of their learning experiences.

NC DMVA Honors 108-Year-Old NC World War II Veteran and Montford Point Marine

Cosmas D. Eaglin, Sr. served during World War II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam War eras

NC LtGen DMVA Secretary, Walter Gaskin, USMC (Ret.), paid tribute to an original Montford Point Marine and World War II Veteran, Cosmas D. Eaglin, Sr. of Fayetteville, NC, with a certificate of appreciation and the Department's challenge coin. Mr. Eaglin's family was present for the intimate congratulatory gathering where the 108-year-old veteran was delighted to receive the recognition of his service.

Born January 12, 1915, Eaglin joined the United States Marine Corps when he was 27. He completed training at Camp Montford Point, in Jacksonville, NC, and was one of the first 300 Black recruits to break the Marine color barrier after President Franklin Roosevelt issued an Executive Order establishing the Fair Employment Practices Commission in 1941. Eaglin served two years in the Solomon Islands campaign during the Pacific War of World War II. After WWII, Eaglin left the Marine Corps but returned to active-duty service and earned his paratrooper wings once joining the U.S.





Army during the Korean War era. He was assigned to Fort Bragg, NC in 1951. He also served two tours in the Vietnam War in the 1960's.

"When I learned of Mr. Eaglin and his service to our country, I found it truly admirable and an inspiration," said Gaskin, "As an original Montford Point Marine, he endured unimaginable obstacles in the segregated Marine Corps. Because he was a Marine, I am able to be a Marine. His contributions to the nation and the Marine Corps will be remembered and his legacy will live on for generations to come."

Eaglin has 6 children, 7 grandchildren, and 12 great-grandchildren. He and his family have been part of the St. Ann Catholic Church community in Fayetteville for 72 years. NC DMVA Secretary Walter Gaskin, and Eaglin's beloved family, gathered in the North Carolina State Veterans Home in Fayetteville to honor this man who has never stopped giving to his family, community, and country. We admire his strength, resilience, and honor his service to our country with appreciation for the inspiration he instills in all of us.





ROTC Cadets Learn Valuable Life Lessons From African American Military Leaders at NC ROTC Roundtable

Over 200 ROTC cadets from Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and other secondary institutions, along with JROTC from high schools across North Carolina learned some valuable life lessons and inspiration from some African American military leaders at an event in Raleigh last month.

The cadets gathered with the Falcon Battalion and schools from many areas around the state at St. Augustine's University in Raleigh as part of the 3rd Annual North Carolina ROTC Roundtable and the African American Military and Veterans Lineage Day. The NC Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (NC DMVA), the Division of Archives in the NC Department of Natural and Cultural Resources, St. Augustine's University, and the Association of the United States Army (AUSA) partnered to teach, coach, and mentor cadets about the important contributions Black military men and women made throughout history. This event also shows that Black military members continue to lead and serve in US Armed Forces. The distinguished panelists at the ROTC Roundtable included:

NC DMVA Welcomes Ms. Jacqueline Bond to the Team



Dedication Ceremony to Take Place in Goldsboro NC Remembering the Service of the Men of the 135th United States "Colored" Infantry

After several years of research, the descendants, community leaders, and historians both local and regional have been able to place Goldsboro as the home for the 135th United States "Colored" Troops, the only Black regiment who paraded in Washington D.C. at the conclusion of the war.

The stakeholders, many of them veterans themselves who have been working on this have inspired the research. In downtown Goldsboro, within eyeshot of the new sign is where these Black men took their oath of allegiance to the United States, jumping from formerly enslaved men to US servicemen. It's a unique place and story.

The new sign marking history is part of the Civil War Trails program which connects visitors to over 1,400 sites just like the one featured. Across six states, each Civil War Trails site enables travelers to stand in the footsteps of historic events or people of the past.



Camp Lejeune Water Contamination

From at least 1953 through 1985, Marines and personnel of any branch of the armed forces and their families stationed at Camp Lejeune's main base, barracks, family, temporary housing, Tarawa Terrace and Hadnot Point may have consumed, and bathed in, water contaminated with toxins at concentrations from 240 to 3400 times levels permitted by safety standards.

Monetary relief may be provided for those injured by exposure to the Camp Lejeune base and its toxic water by^[45] 30 days of "living" or "working" or "otherwise" being exposed between 1953 and 1987 is the prerequisite for compensation.
